A Message from Fr. Dennis Aréchiga



"We are an Easter People and Alleluia is our song!" Anonymous

After having avoided uttering it throughout Lent, the Octave of Easter is filled with Alleluias in the Gospel Acclamation and in the Dismissal Rite. Balthasar Fischer wrote the following reflection upon this unique word. "It is an unusual word that is not native to the English or even the Latin liturgical vocabulary: the word 'Alleluia.' As a matter of fact, it sounds less like a meaningful word than the babbling of a child. . . . 'Alleluia' does, of course, have a meaning. It is a Hebrew word, and down the centuries the church has brought it with her, untranslated (like 'Amen'), as a product of the Jewish soil from which she herself sprang and as

a reminder of her earliest days. The word is a cry of jubilation meaning 'Praise the Lord,' and occurs frequently in the psalms. . . .

But the translation does not explain why the church chose and retained this word from the Hebrew language of prayer in order to express her Easter jubilation. . . . I think the church meant to say: in the presence of the mystery that we celebrate on Easter, the mystery of our redemption, our usual intelligible vocabulary is inadequate; when faced with the superabundant mercy of God we can only stammer in amazement like children."

This is how it is with us Christians: As we gaze at the Sun that has risen high over the darkness and cold of our Good Friday, all well-chosen words are useless. We can only stammer out our Alleluia of wonder and jubilation." If we let the meaning of Easter seep into our soul – Christ's victory over sin and death and the bright promise we have of experiencing life eternal – our Alleluia's truly do praise God for the marvelous wonders of salvation and redemption that Easter promises. May we, an Easter People, let our Alleluias resound so as to infiltrate our souls with hope, peace and joy today.

How Much Is Enough?

I've got some great news for some of you: Jesus Christ doesn't care what name you bear. He doesn't care where you were born, and he doesn't care what your family tree looks like. He doesn't care where you grew up or where you went to school.

I've also got some bad news for some of you.

It's so easy to take our salvation for granted. The mercy of God makes it so. Look at John the Baptist — he was pouring water on everybody who wanted it. Everybody but one group: those who expected it. Those who thought it was a given because of who they were, because of what they were. Those who had no intention of doing the work of repentance.

Sometimes, because God is so faithful, we make the mistake of forgetting that He is also just.

I am baptized, we think. I made my First Communion, and I was Confirmed. That's enough.

I went to Catholic school. I know all the Ten Commandments and I can tell you anything you want to know about the Popes. That's enough.

I'm on parish council. I put money in the basket, and I volunteer. That's enough.

None of it is enough. It would never be enough. And before we look upon the Pharisees and Sadducees with too much judgment, we need to remember: the work of repentance is ongoing. It is a process that we must commit to within ourselves, continuously.

God is the missing element to this equation. He is the one who raises children to Abraham from the stones. If we rely only on our own abilities, our own merits, our own offerings, it will never be enough.

Giving publicly traded shares of stock, bonds, or mutual funds to St. Mark the Evangelist Catholic Church (SMECC) allows you to turn an appreciated asset into support for a purpose you choose such as faith formation, general operating expenses, or a particular program.

You'll receive a charitable income tax deduction for your gift, and as a qualified non-profit, SMECC can then sell the stock without having to pay capital gains tax. All proceeds from the sale will be used for the purposes you specify.

The real cost of your gift is reduced, since you'll save on income and capital gains taxes by giving appreciated stock or mutual fund shares to SMECC.

You can use your securities to make different types of gifts, including:

An outright gift that gives you a charitable deduction for the value of the security while avoiding capital gains taxes.

A gift that gives you income back

and an immediate tax deduction, while leaving the assets to SMECC like a life insurance property or variable annuity.

We thank God and you the community of St. Mark who are the instrument that allows us to do what we do. Without your help we are not able to lend a helping hand to those that need the most.


May the Lord continue to bless you and your families. We are eternally grateful for your generosity. Please continue to keep us in your prayers.

Scholarship Recipients Announced

It's Springtime, the time when high school seniors focus on the future. Some are seeking fulltime employment in June, others are considering further schooling at universities, vocational schools or other educational institutions. For those planning on furthering their schooling, a major consideration is usually finding ways to cover the costs. Ten of our parish youth will be receiving financial reward from two of our parish organizations, The Women's Guild and The Knights of Columbus.

While many scholarships are based primarily on academic performance, these scholarships require more. Each student must demonstrate writing skills through an essay and verbal skills by an interview of a six member board. Applicants must also demonstrate participation in school and community activities. But most importantly, they must demonstrate lifetime performance in Church-related activities.

The selection process involves 20 evaluators, half from the Women's Guild and half from the Knights of Columbus, using a process of anonymity, except for the interviews. The two organizations are pleased to announce the following. The Wom-

The St. Mark Young Church annual Spring Retreat took place at Camp Chrysalis in Kerrville, Texas, the weekend of March 10-12. On Friday night, 38 teens and 7 adults departed St. Mark, each of us going to a new place, unsure of what the Lord had in store.

We broke open the theme for this formation year, "Always Forward," by identifying the burdens we face in our daily lives and learning how to respond in the face of suffering. Our goal is to go "always forward" towards Heaven, but life gets in the way. We each experience different hardships that may make it difficult for us to move forward, but we are called to be persistent and resilient. We discussed the importance of prayer and the Sacraments and were given the opportunity to go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and spend time in front of the Blessed Sacrament in Eucharistic Adoration. Many of our teens went to Confession for the first time in years, some hadn't been since their first Reconciliation! We are grateful for Rev. Rafael Duda and Msgr. Peter Flood for being available to hear confessions and offer the Lord's Love and Mercy.

Our schedule allowed for the teens to have a lot of time to grow in community and encounter the beauty of creation at the retreat center. Groups of teens hiked up to the cross

overlooking the grounds and we were far enough out of the city to get a beautiful view of the stars at night, so many laid in the field looking up into the sky. We spent Saturday afternoon participating in low ropes team-building activities, playing volleyball, basketball, and Gaga ball, and enjoying the beautiful spring

weather. This time was beneficial for many of our teens as they started to get to know each other and grow in friendship.

I lead our teens every Sunday night and watch as they sit on their phones and ignore each other during dinner or struggle to make conversation during small group time. Something about being on retreat makes them take down their walls and talk

to the people in front of them. Seeing the teens that sit 5 feet from each other in New Legacy at Life Teen finally becoming friends, breaking out of their shells, showing their personalities, and feeling comfortable around new people is something I cherish as their Youth Minister. If you have ever chaperoned a

youth retreat, you may understand this experience.

Teens were coming up to me and saying, "I wish this retreat happened sooner because I feel like I know



people better now." While I am taking their feedback into consideration for the upcoming formation year, I trust God's timing. I trust that this weekend was meant to happen when it did, it was meant to bring these teens together now. It was not an accident that God united this group of teens and adults to discuss the burdens in our lives and learn how to move forward together. The Holy Spirit is alive and moving in the hearts of the youth of St. Mark. He is bringing together a community that will radically transform our parish and world. Please keep praying for us! Pray especially for those who went on Spring Retreat and will sooner or later encounter the stress and worries of their daily lives, that they may be resilient and persistent and move "always forward."

I finally gave him and his friend Mr. Carlos a name tag, as they officially became honorary members. Mr. Pearce asked me if we would do a special project for the Veterans in Hospitals and Assisted Living Facilities. We discussed his idea, and decided to set aside some time to dedicate to this worthwhile project.

Mr. Pearce asked if we would make red, white, and blue lapghans for his fellow military servicemen and women, who are cared for after serving their country. I contacted one of the representatives of a facility we had donated other items to in the past, and they were overjoyed. Mr. Pearce also wanted to sponsor the yarn and other supplies needed to make them, so, off we went with this project. We received a headcount from my nursing facility contact, and we were ready to start the project to coincide with Veterans Day.

We finishing 24 lapphans and a prayer shawl for one of the female patients. Father Dennis agreed to come to our meeting room and graciously blessed every one of them. For privacy consideration, we will not show their faces in our article, but I would like to show you, Mr. Pearce, his friend, Carlos and some of the beautiful, smiling ladies who made the items, and many who were not pictured. The facility management and employees had a party for their Veteran patients, and distributed the lovingly handmade prayer shawl items to their patients. I am told that, "There were lots of smiles".

We say "Thank You, For Your




