

"Then repay to Caesar

what belongs to Caesar and to God

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This passage from Matthew 22:15-21, the Gospel for the 29th Sunday in

Ordinary Time, contrasts our obligations in the public sphere of our lives from those that belong to the spiritual sphere. Jesus carefully avoids the trap that the Pharisees have laid for him to enter into an argument about whether one owes taxes or not and instead opens up the conversation to a larger issue: what do we owe God?

The truth is, we owe everything to God! The gift of our universe, world and our lives all come from the creative hand of God. Even as we use our own talents and hard work to create and build material things that benefit us, we are called to be aware that underlying these achievements is the foundation of the gift of life that God has given us. In truth, everything we have is a gift from God.

Psalm 116:12 states: "How can I repay the Lord for all the good done for me?" Indeed, God has not only gifted us with life but many other blessings as well. When we give to the Church our gift does indeed make a return to the Lord for the bounty we have received. It is in our church that we house the worship that those who participate in our liturgies deepen their understanding of the Word of God and are renewed by the transformational gift of the Eucharist. It is in our parish that we offer formation of faith all the way from young children to teenagers and adults through our Religious Education Programs, R.C.I.A., Bible Studies, retreats and other ministries. The buildings in which these liturgies and ministries take place require support for utilities, upkeep and critical repairs. This summer we were able to reinforce the roofs on Buildings 1, 2 and one of our Pre-School Portables as well as replace an A.C. unit there. The renovation of the rectory to ensure we can house an additional priest if sent to us is underway. We rely on your support to keep our doors open to welcome those who benefit from fellowship in faith here.

At times we can think our gift in such a large parish is not as consequential as if we belonged to a smaller congregation. However, a large parish, such as ours, has an even greater need and potential to form, minister to and serve more persons. Every donation of time, talent or treasure given is greatly appreciated and contributes to our parish's efforts to be a means of evangelization and outreach for others. Today, then, think of all the blessings you have received in your life. Then, ask the Lord how you can make a return to God for all the good God has done for you!



Young Church Faith Formation

At our first session of Life Teen and Edge, I invited our teens and their families to think about the "good news." Our Mission statement at St. Mark is "to share the good news of Jesus Christ with all God's people by word and action," but if we don't ourselves know or believe what this "good news" is, how can we share it with others?

In Pope Francis' Exhortation to young people, Christus Vivit, he states three great truths that we must live by: God loves you, Christ is our Savior, and Christ is Alive! Because He loves us, He sent His Son to die for our sins so that we can spend eternity with Him. But Jesus didn't just die; He rose! He is alive!! Before He ascended into Heaven he promised his disciples, "Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20)

Sometimes it is easy to forget just how present Jesus is to me. If I can't see him or feel him at all times, my faith can falter. Can you relate?

My brothers and sisters, Jesus not only promised to send us an Advocate, the Holy Spirit to be with us and give us wisdom, piety, and fortitude. Jesus gave us himself; His body and blood, soul and divinity. Jesus gave us the Eucharist!

In those moments that I forget that I CAN see and feel Jesus in the Eucharist, I know I need to get to Mass. What a beautiful gift God has given us in the Mass. I remember as a child I would spend most of the homily looking at the ceiling, counting how many light bulbs were out. As a teen I figured out that when the ushers came forward with the baskets, we were halfway done. It wasn't until college that I began to appreciate the liturgy and even the significance of being able to consume the Eucharist.

There is a statistic going around that 70% of Catholics don't believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. 70% of people who attend Mass think what we do is a symbol or remembrance of what happened during the Last Supper. In response to that shockingly high number, the Church is undergoing a revival.

"The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist." (eucharisticrevival. org)

Jesus in John, Chapter 6, tells his followers, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day." Jesus loses followers after saying this, but he never takes it back. He doesn't call out "wait you guys, I was kidding..." He lets them return to their former lives, he turns to the 12 disciples, and asks "Do you also want to leave?" Peter answers with great faith, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

As I learn more about my faith, I hope my response will always be like Peter's at this moment! When my faith is shaken, when it is hard to believe, when I am confronted with the reality of our fallen world, I want to always remember the gift of the Eucharist. I want to share the good news of Jesus Christ with my brothers and sisters who have fallen away from the Catholic Faith because they do not believe in the Real Presence of the Eucharist. Will you join me in praying for revival? For deeper understanding of, and greater reverence toward the Eucharist?

Order of Alhambra

There comes times in a person's life, when he or she wants to respond to Jesus' desire for putting one's faith into action through charitable works. One such organization is the little known Order of Alhambra, which was founded in Brooklyn, New York in 1904 by William Harper Bennett. It is a Catholic men's fraternal organization (with some similarities to the Knights of Columbus, but with a history and theme based on the Moors and their palace of Alhambra in Spain about a thousand years ago.) In line with this theme is the hat, called a fez, worn by members. This hat attracts attention, but little is known about

the groups of men who wear it.

So, here's the scoop! The Order of Alhambra has members in groups called caravans in the United States and some other countries. San Antonio has two caravans, which have members from various parishes in the area. I am the Chaplain for our Alamo Caravan (No. 269). The mission is threefold: 1) Serving people with intellectual disabilities which includes: donations to private schools educating intellectually disabled children and adults and providing them with vocational skills; participating in Special Olympics; conducting recreation, field day programs and summer camps; providing field trips, boat rides, zoo trips, circus trips, picnics, Christmas parties,

dinner dances, etc. 2) Memorializing Catholic History i.e., to identify, mark, preserve, and commemorate Catholic historical places, events and persons of international or regional importance. Over 160 such memorials have been established in Canada and the United States. 3) Sociability is a dominant characteristic of the Order. It flows from another stated purpose of the Order, namely, "To promote social, fraternal and intellectual associations and through its Caravans provide a practical means to form enduring fellowship and friendship among its members." The Order is a "fun" organization dedicated to doing worthwhile charitable work.

Gifts of Publicly Traded Securties

Giving publicly traded shares of stock, bonds, or mutual funds to St. Mark the Evangelist Catholic Church (SMECC) allows you to turn an appreciated asset into support for a purpose you choose such as faith formation, general operating expenses, or a particular program. You'll receive a charitable income tax deduction for your gift, and as a qualified non-profit, SMECC can then sell the stock without having to pay capital gains tax. All proceeds from the sale will be used for the purposes you specify.

1) The real cost of your gift is reduced, since you'll save on income and capital gains taxes by giving appreciated stock or mutual fund shares to SMECC.

2) You can use your securities to make different types of gifts, including:

So, what does Alamo Caravan do in our San Antonio community? Every Christmas Alhambrans donate Christmas presents to the clients of the Autism Treatment Center, fulfilling some of their wishes. We don't get to see them open the gifts, but we know they bring love and joy. Our Grand Commander has used his special talent of dressing up as Santa Claus the past few years and had the children and adults get gifts and pictures with "Santa." Donating and cooking food on a cookout, usually using an Alhambran's top-of- theline BBQ rig whether it be to provide a meal or to raise funds for the clients of the Autism Treatment Center or of the Reaching Maximum Independence Center or of the Saddle Light Center for Therapeutic Horseback Riding occurs several times yearly. Lunch meals would be provided to the intellectually disabled of these centers during outings to Morgan's Wonderland or Altitude Trampoline Park or a city park like McAllister

Park. Then there are the special occasions of presenting checks of money raised through fund raising events to these various treatment centers and to educational institutions like Our Lady of the Lake University for scholarships for students studying in areas of special needs. Of course there is the important area of our charitable work in identifying and marking historical sites, persons, and events. We've marked St. Mary's Catholic Church downtown years ago and more recently Holy Redeemer Catholic Church with historical plaques near the entrance. Finally, there are the social gatherings of Special Needs Masses, annual picnic, Christmas party, etc.




